


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President's Message





SOUTHWEST REGION

ollowing our Corse Southwest kick-off event on The Streets of Willow last November, late March brought our second Corse Southwest Track Day, this time on "The Fastest Road in the West," the super fast Big Willow circuit.

Seeking to create a Ferrari-centric track experience, the FCA-SW is venturing to provide track activities that prioritize driver education while promoting member camaraderie via shared experiences.

This event was again made possible with the guidance and assistance of Chris Carel's Fast Toys Club, who served as our track vendor. Chris and Patrick Orozco put together a great team of instructors and their efforts co-managing the event were invaluable.

Although the challenges of negotiating a fast circuit such as Big Willow introduce broader demands on the driver, it's a great carry-over from the lessons beginning drivers learned on streets.

Willow Springs' primary circuit is the oldest continually operated road course in North America, quite a step up from the technical Streets of Willow circuit. Big Willow's undulating, 2.5 mile combination of long straights with sweeping curves provide a lot of grip and make it one of the fastest road courses in North America in terms of average lap speed.










FCA-SW members enjoyed the opportunity to choose between two run groups, the first being our beginner/ novice group which offered advanced, dedicated driver instruction. The second group served our more experienced track day runners, following the standard open-track approach for their sessions.

All participants across both run groups benefited from the presence of FCA-SW member John Marconi, the very first Ferrari Challenge North America Champion, and 2nd place finisher in the 348 World Challenge Series. John was on hand to offer guidance to any driver, whether advanced or novice level. It was great to have John on hand.

Braking discipline on corner entry, steering input, and throttle input on exit emphasize the importance of balance and placing one's car on the correct line. Big Willow's speeds give the driver a more dramatic sense of weight-transfer, and thus a better turf to practice proper technique. Even on a fast circuit such as Big Willow, it's a great test ground for gaining experience on just how critical it is to be smooth.

For our March event, we also opened the door for FCA members to come out for the day, spectate, enjoy lunch, and chat with their fellow members participating on track. The goal, of course, is to break down the barriers and myths about going on track that too often dissuade members who truly would like to become more confident behind the wheel. It is far safer to drive one's Ferrari on track than on the street, where any attempt to even remotely test their car's potential performance is incredibly dangerous.

We would like to encourage our FCA-SW membership to take advantage of the next CORSE SOUTHWEST event on November 1, when we will return to Big Willow. We will follow up that day with another education-centric, final track day event of the year on technical The Streets of Willow Circuit, in early 2025. *SF*






reated to serve FCA-SW members in the San Gabriel Valley, the 3rd Annual "A Most Excellent Drive," featuring another fantastic route penned by FCA SW Member Joe Napoli, took off from San Dimas on May 19 under a cool marine layer that soon gave way to beautiful blue skies and a most excellent adventure!

Penned by Signor Napoli, this year's route was not for the faint of heart. Traversing several foothill communities into the the San Gabriel Mountain range, we warmed the tires through Horse Thief Canyon, Marshall Canyon, and lovely Padua Hills. The foothill roads offered wide thoroughfares with sweeping turns and long straightaways, perfect for exercising a stallion. Soon after our departure we ascended into the quaint village of Mt. Baldy. Our scenic route provided some amazing vistas and joyous canyon tunnels that echoed captivating Ferrari exhaust notes across the hillsides.

This Most Excellent Drive passed Mt. Baldy onto a narrow, technically challenging route where the smallest distraction might cause several to miss an important turn! Even when it was the only one!

Climbing through the mountains we then descended onto Camp Williams Resort for a moment to stretch our legs, regroup, and calm concerned campers that our Stallions were circling their encampment. The Lyon Family Collection Tour

We experience a beautiful private collection of motoring

ver three decades, Tom Brockmiller has brought many unic 1e and memorable events to the Southwest Region's calendar.

From the club's Annual Picnic (formerly held at South Coast Botanic Garden), the Ortega Run, weekend getaways to Mojave, to simply being one of the most engaged and valued members to elevate the FCA experience, Tom set a high bar from the very beginning. Having served as our 2nd Region President, he is one of the key reasons our region is so healthy and vibrant with activity today.

To our benefit, Tom shows no sign of slowing down, and the June 9, 2024 Tour of the Lyon Family Collection proved no exception. This unique opportunity, made possible through Tom's close relationship with automotive photographer extraordinaire Royce Rumsey, who serves as the collection's official photographer, gave our members a chance to tour and learn about what must be one of the most diverse automotive collections in the world.

Thus, it was no surprise that demand for this event proved to be among the highest the club has ever presented, as all of the available slots sold out in a single day's time!

Borrowing from Shaun Tolson of The Robb Report to provide a little bit of background, General William Lyon grew up in Southern California 'consumed with a love for automobiles'. Hollywood's stars were of far less interest to Lyon than the cars they drove.

Lyon purchased his first car, a Model T, for \$8. Almost five decades later, he began to teach his 13-year old son, Bill, how to drive, and their relationship flourished from their mutual fascination with automobiles. The Lyon Family Collection represents their close bond, including almost 100 cars spanning various genres, as Bill says, "each car, and the collection as a whole, is significant for the family memories they provide."

Graciously hosted by Bill, and assisted by Royce and the estate staff including Lisa Briscoe and Gary Haddy, the day began under comfortable grey skies with a casual one-hour drive from our meet/check-in point in Orange through Santiago Canyon, Trabuco Canyon, then skirting Mission Viejo that gave way to breaking sunshine as we arrived at the Estate in Coto de Caza.

Nearing 30 Ferraris in total, our team of Prancing Horses graced the beautiful drive up to the estate's 24,000 sq ft. museum, built adjacent the Lyon Residence on the gorgeous hilltop estate. If the grounds alone weren't impressive enough, we were warmly welcomed to the museum by Bill Lyon as he enthusiastically shared stories about the collection and some of the most stunning examples of American Classics to postwar sports and racing cars to be found anywhere.

A few of the notable examples included the 1929 Duesenberg Model J LeBaron Dual-Cowl Phaeton (the very first example built, which was also the personal car of Fred and Augie Duesenberg and used as a test-drive/promo/ sales car for California's rich and famous customers), a 1935 Packard convertible, (the very first car General Lyon restored), and a 1935 Duesenberg SJ Gurney Nutting Speedster.

The collection is quite simply so large that it would require pages to report in depth, but it also includes other genres, such as those closer to Bill's own, unique interests. Active in historic racing, especially in vintage Porsches such as a 1960 RS 60 Spyder and a 1961 356 Carrera Abarth GTL, Bill's passion in the collection can be found in many cars including the Pebble Beach Gran Turismo Award winning 1965 Alfa Romeo TZ2 Zagato Competition Berlinetta. The collection also includes a couple of Ferraris . . . a Daytona Spider and Testarossa.

Following the tour we fired up our ponies and made the short drive from the estate over to O'Neill's Bar & Grill at the Arroyo Trabuco Golf Club, where the staff welcomed us with special seating and a delicious lunch overlooking the course and the rolling hills to the east.

The club would very much like to extend our warmest thanks to Bill, the Lyon Estate staff, and most of all Tom and Royce for a wonderful, much appreciated opportunity to share in this fantastic collection. SF








The Cavallino Rampante LAPD Mounted Platoon Police Horses Event IV

he Southwest Region is known across the FCA for bringing our members unique and special events and our continued relationship with LAPD's Mounted Platoon continues the tradition.

This past June 22nd was our fourth opportunity to join the men and women (and horses) of the Mounted Platoon and Officer Eric Coffee had another special day planned for us.

The afternoon started by meeting in the parking lot of the Los Angeles Police Academy where we were greeted by Enzo, the FCA's sponsored horse. After a brief "Welcome", we were allowed to drive our cars into the Academy grounds and on to the Athletic Field. This is the same field where the Academy cadets graduate to become LAPD Officers. On the field we were treated to a K-9 demonstration of take down techniques highlighting the skills of the trainers and the dogs with some Q & A on dog breeds, training and other information on the K-9 Service.

Our afternoon continued from there, breaking into small groups for a Police escorted drive through a portion of Griffith Park as we made our way to the Ahmanson Equestrian Center, also known as the "Horse Barn". Located in the Atwater Village area, this 2-acre facility has 40 stalls and training facilities and is the home of the Mounted Platoon.



The SW Region members were introduced to the incoming new Mounted Platoon Officers who were nearing the end of their training. The new officers, along with several of the established officers, put on a riding display going over their horsemanship for crowd control and how they work with the horses. Officer Coffee narrated the show, explaining the purposes of the different systems and procedures used. This was followed by a BBQ Dinner, expertly prepared by the BBQ Chefs Mike Coffee and Pat Coffee – father and uncle of Officer Eric Coffee (Mike Coffee is retired LAPD). The dinner, as always, was excellent and put everyone in the mood for the rest of the evening.

The generosity of our members from this event raised around \$30,000 for the Mounted Platoon Foundation and collectively, over our past 4 FCA-SW events, well over \$100,000 has been raised. onna Chen's parents fled the Canton (Guangzhou) area of South China and the advancing Red Army in the early 1950's with \$27 and their lives. Donna and her sisters were born and raised in Southern California, surround by car culture.

"Dad always liked cars and shaped our appreciation of automobiles. He taught us adolescent, young women how to drive a manual transmission, change oil, coolant, radiator hoses, brake pads, pack bearings, change carburetor, tires, check inflation pressure, and much more. We lived next door to an auto parts store. We got the most out of our cars. We would walk over to the store many times for new, used, or rebuilt parts.

"Dad's first car was a used 1950 Custom Deluxe 'Shoe Box' 2-door Ford Sedan. I recall sitting in the passenger seat looking at the five-inch hole in the floor board and watching the street pass by under my dangling feet.

"We would wax and polish the chrome bumpers and body paint on our second-hand 1959 Ford 2-door Custom 300 every weekend. I'm surprised with all that polishing the metal didn't show through the green paint!" Donna went on to earn degrees in science and engineering, started a family, taught college courses, and managed water quality issues for local government.



Donna shares a little insight on her Ferrari passion here:

Where did the fascination begin?

Shortly after getting my driver's license and on the road, I saw a beautiful car and thought, 'Wow. That's a nice car! I hope someday to have one like that.' Didn't know at the time what it was, but later found out it was a Ferrari.

Favorite Ferrari Racing Driver?

After school we would watch the races on TV. We admired Niki Lauda for his perseverance and return to racing after the accident, his entrepreneurship, and, of course, his wins!

The road cars . . . Mid-engine sport or an ox-pulling-the cart GT?

Both. The mid-engine sport is so fun. For a long road trip, definitely the GT for a powerful smooth ride.

First Ferrari?

The F430, a retirement gift to myself!

I was a real neophyte starting out. I did not have any friends with a Ferrari to ask questions and was not aware of the FCA. All I heard on YouTube was that they always caught on fire. I visited dealerships up and down Southern California, and test drove a 360, looking for that cruising speed sweet spot. After the drive, I thought, 'How about more power?' One of our sons, a car enthusiast, recommended the F430 and helped in the search.

Eventually, we found 140084 four hundred miles away in Palo Alto. My husband and I took a trip up. It was beautiful. The dealer just received the car and I was the first person to test drive it.

During the test drive, I had the 'Aha' moment; it had the excitement and felt special. The dealer didn't know how special the car was, with unique options all around.

In 48 hours it was mine. Our son was home to receive shipment while I was at work, and he has permission to drive it occasionally. After all, it's all about sharing the joy!

Most memorable or most-enjoyed club experience?

Soon after joining the SW Region, I decided to attend the Board meeting at the Petersen, but with some trepidation as I was very new to Ferrari ownership. The board members were so friendly and welcoming. I will always remember that.

All the FCA-SW events are awesome, unique, special, and fun. I appreciate all the planning and time that Board Members and volunteers spend to make these events happen. It is gratifying to have the opportunity to support many organizations through the events, such as the foundations of Edwards Air Force Base and LAPD. Also, the opportunity to visit places not generally open to the public and various drives have broadened my knowledge base.

Related hobbies, passions, or collections?

I have done some traveling for work, and a memorable trip was to Santiago, Chile in 1993, with three other lecturers from the University of California. We collapsed in the hotel for a good night's sleep after a long flight. About midnight, an earthquake struck. I was so exhausted, I said to myself, "If it gets to be about a 4 (Richter Scale), then I'll get up."

After the conference, we rode the subway to explore the city and took an exit to a public square to find ourselves in the middle of a big anti-Pinochet protest! My husband and I enjoy travel and have been to many places, especially Europe.

While we are home, my interest is transitioning our yard landscape to California native plants. Easy to grow, these plants do not need fertilizer, and need very little water once established as they are acclimated to our soil and climate. They also provide food, shelter, and nesting sites for native wildlife. If you see a Monarch butterfly, it may have come from our yard! I have held native plant workshops at local middle school summer programs.

Memorable Ferrari moment?

I had the good fortune to visit The Factory with another family car enthusiast. The overall experiences with Ferrari and the FCA have increased my appreciation of Ferrari history, engineering, design, symbolism, and ownership.



Pearl Harbor Aviation Museum Our first military base visit

he month of July represents America's Independence and what better way to celebrate than a visit to the Pearl Harbor Aviation Museum for our first ever military base event.

Our early morning drive started at the Ferrari of Hawaii dealer with coffee and malasadas to inject caffeine & sugar into our blood. An eclectic line up of automotive machinery were on hand to enjoy this drive event. Representing Ferrari were a 296 GTB, Roma, Portofino, California T, and two 458 Italias. In addition to the Ferraris, a Lamborghini Revuelto with a trio of Huracan STOs, Porsche 911 GT3s, McLaren 675LT, Lotus Emira, Aston Martin Vanquish and a Bentley Bentayga rounded the drive group.

The drive for this event would attempt to mimic Maverick's tower flyby emotions with the assistance of all the available tunnels on Oahu. For our first flyby, we made our way through the John H. Wilson tunnel on the LikeLike Highway leading to a fun twisty backroad named Kapa'a Quarry Road. This road offers a beautiful, lush foliage path to the Pali Highway. The Nu'uanu Pali tunnels make up four highway tunnels, two in each direction, and all four can easily be enjoyed within minutes by taking the Nu'uanu Pali Drive and heading back to Kailua. We then proceeded to the H3 scenic lookout to regroup before driving through the last and longest tunnel, the Tetsuo Harano Tunnel, leading us onto Ford Island in Pearl Harbor.



Ferrari of Hawaii is one of the largest donors to the Pearl Harbor Aviation Museum. With their assistance, and the friendly Pearl Harbor staff, we were offered complimentary access to the museum. The red carpet was literally rolled out for our visit, and we were given a once in a lifetime photo opportunity next to the iconic Ford Island Control Tower, as seen in many photos and videos during the December 7, 1941 attack. Next photo opportunities included pictures alongside a Blue Angel F/A-18C Hornet, F-14D Tomcat, F-111C Aardvark, F-15A Eagle and many more amazing aircraft.

Members perused the museum, theater, Hangar 79 and the Walt Disney Studios World War II exhibition. This limited time exhibition runs until December 31st and displays over 1,200 insignias for the Armed Forces, animated short films with Disney characters, posters and publications created when Walt Disney opened his studio to support the war effort the day after Pearl Harbor was attacked.

Much to take in and be grateful for, thanks to our veterans. A considerable donation was given to the museum to thank them for this most memorable day. SF







Autry Museum of The American West

A visit to the ol' west

hirty-six Prancing Horses and one prancing Bison were on display at the Autry Museum of the American West event in Los Angeles.

The museum, located in Griffith Park directly across from the Los Angeles Zoo, hosted 65 Southwest Region members to docent led tours of the museum, followed by an excellent lunch from the Habit Burger Grill. A large, dedicated and secured parking area was set aside for everyone to park their Ferrari; the Bison was kept securely inside the museum.

The Autry was established in 1988 by actor and businessman Gene Autry as "Gene Autry Western Heritage Museum," dedicated to exploring and sharing the comprehensive story of the American West. Its collection includes 21,000 paintings, sculptures, costumes, textiles, firearms, tools, toys, and musical instruments. On display are gorgeous exhibits of classic and famous saddles and leather goods, native American and cowboy costumes and culture, restored stagecoach and chuck wagon exhibits, extensive oil painting exhibits, a complete and original saloon with gambling tables and roulette wheels, and, of course, the Bison. For those interested in rare and famous revolvers and rifles from the American Southwest, the Autry's collection includes the manufacturers of Winchester and Remington and one of the finest collections of Colt revolvers in the country. Also included are guns owned by famous people, such as Theodore Roosevelt's Winchester rifle, Annie Oakley's revolvers, Pancho Villa's pistol, and Billy the Kid's rifle. Many of the artifacts were generously donated to the museum by Autry members and supporters.



The Autry's Southwest Museum of the American Indian Collection of Native American art, located in Mt. Washington, is second only to the Smithsonian Institution National Museum of the American Indian. The 238,000-piece collection includes 14,000 baskets, 10,000 ceramic items, 6,300 textiles and weavings, and more than 1,100 pieces of jewelry. It represents work by indigenous peoples from Alaska to South America, with an emphasis on cultures of California and the Southwestern United States.

The two-hour tours of the museum were considered quite short considering the number of interesting and beautiful items on display. A good time was had by all, and everyone congratulated Jim Bindman for organizing such a unique experience of our Southwest Region. SF

Allow me to wind back the clock to a random Friday in the middle of March about five years ago. I was in sixth grade and had just strolled back in the house ready to begin my weekend with my Dad. My mother was out for the weekend to celebrate her birthday with some friends which is code to any man for "let's make bad decisions". So I put down my backpack and my Dad was surfing on his computer and I asked him what he was looking at. He would say five words to me which would end up leading to one of the greatest chapters in our lives, "I'm just window shopping Ferraris."

It didn't take long for me to start shopping myself, and he stumbled onto one car which was seemingly too good to be true. Everything about the car looked perfect and the price would be alien in today's market. Naturally, over dinner I decided to show him Doug DeMuro's video on the car. Which car am I alluding to you may be wondering? The car in question was the Ferrari F430, the last single clutch mid-engine V8 ever to leave Maranello, which also was the first production Ferrari to use the same computer modeling as the Formula 1 team. Safe to say Doug did a 10/10 job selling the car because we went to go and look at the car the next day. I still have video footage of the first time we started the car at the dealership, a euphoric moment which would mark the beginning of a new era. Seven days later on March 30th, 2019, we took delivery of the car. I will never forget as my Dad and I were driving down North Hollywood Way and we heard the burbles from the flat plane crank V8. The valved exhaust system opened at around 3,000 RPM and we both turned to each other at the same time, baffled by the beast which my dad had just bought.

My dad's is Grigio Silverstone over a black interior with the F1 gearbox, an absolute gentlemen's spec which plays perfectly into the carbon fiber interior accents. My Dad and I always joke that Francesco must have had some good pizza the night before because the amount of flake in the paint is absolutely breathtaking when sitting next to other cars of the same color. This particular V8 is quite special, however. I mentioned the term "flat plane crank" a little earlier and now it's time for a little engine lesson. A flat plane crank engine has a 180-degree configuration that creates a higher pitched note and faster revving engine, which are also most commonly used in race cars. That's because cross plane crank engines have a 90-degree configuration, rev more slowly, have a lower pitched note, and also provide less vibration. The particular flat plane crank which is featured in the F430 produces 490 horsepower and 343 pound feet of torque.

However, enough about the car because while I could rant about facts and figures all day, this is the story of my Dad's car and our journey with the FCA SW Region. We were first introduced to the club whilst out for lunch at Good Stuff in West LA. Peter Lund, currently Chairman of the Board SW Region, saw our car in the lot and spotted my Dad wearing a Ferrari hat inside the restaurant. He came inside and introduced himself, telling us that we should join the club. My Dad and I were thrilled by the notion of having other enthusiasts to share the road with and as they say, the rest is history. Countless events and stories which I could recount end over end in great detail and memories which will last me a lifetime have been created. 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Every Testarossa Has a Story

sk any guy about his Ferrari and he'll tell you volumes about what's under the hood. Ask any guy with a Testarossa and he'll tell you that his emotional start button is on "ON" already, with a lasting love for more than what's under the hood.



To test that premise, we asked a few Testarossa folks in the Southwest Region of the Ferrari Club of America (FCA) about their cars. As the interviewer, I began the conversation with the imperative "tell me about your Testarossa" rather than asking a question, to which I first got the blurt "I love it" from Burton Johnson before the imperative got out of my mouth! Other owners answered as quickly, giving their own spin on the depth and direction of the emotive responses to their Testarossas. I took joy from initiating a conversation with these fellows about their Ferraris minus the tech talk and citation of specifications that typically occur.

Maranello introduced the first factory Testarossa in 1984. Not long after did the Testarossa come into the public eye when a pair of delicious detectives in a late 1980s TV series called Miami Vice showed up in a white Ferrari. The two crime stoppers – acting as James Crockett and Ricardo Tubbs -- got the nation's attention while gluing people to the TV screen to see the handsome, eye-popping, crime-stopping, Vice Squad duo doing their thing to nab the bad dudes in a seriously gorgeous Testarossa, as white as winter snow where there never is any, ever. Each of our Club members opted for the red/tan combo for their Testarossas, playing it more traditionally for the car of their dreams than the vice squad would for chasing drug dealers in Miami. "I feel like a movie star" blurted Burton Johnson again on the choice of his car. "It's something about the nostalgia," he said in a revelation showing that TV and the 1980s, indeed, had some local effect, which still exists to this day. So, is it the car, the color, the style, the strakes, the stardom, or what?

Miami Vice also brought sexy unbuttoned pastel shirts, white suits, and no-socks wardrobes for men to delight the women watching the show. Maybe the men watching lamented why boring "business casual" still prevailed in their own workplace wardrobes without a Ferrari ever offered as the company car. Happy to admit private ownership, FCA Club member, Michael Berger, still drives his 1992 512 TR to work when it's not on loan to the Petersen

Museum or on display at The Vault in the Maranello Masterpieces exhibit. "It's practical. It feels like myself. It's my soul. And everybody likes that car." With longevity in mind, Michael stated "I'll keep it till I die" while speaking with truth of his Ferrari as its original owner for 32 years already.

From its beginnings, Testarossa got everybody's attention, from one's head on down, as the real star of Miami Vice for the obscenely stunning car that hit the chase scenes running flat-out fast, without so much as an iota of bad-shocks body sway or rear end spinning out. Testarossa became a household word for the young, the old, and everyone in between watching the show while stirring up every emotional response imaginable among the viewers. The show stood as the sexy stimulant of TV screens for six years in a row, and the car wasn't nicknamed the "Testosterossa" for nothing.

Arising from that unavoidable thought, Testarossa exists indeed as one sexy-looking car, no doubt whatsoever. With his 1987 first-version Testarossa did club member David Lee admit his difficulty in articulating just what drove him toward the Testarossa, but the thought eventually came out: "It's the curves." That remark heated the wires in the phone lines such that I could feel his blush through the receiver. But, it had to be there from the times his early passion for cars reached its pinnacle in Ferraris to the time when he finally afforded a Testarossa. "It has a presence....that wide rear end." No Ferrarista in her right mind could disagree with that.

While the FCA Southwest Region covers an enormous area, Testarossas grace its territory with the special camaraderie of FCA Club membership. One such member, Robert Medawar, hosted an FCA event in one of his retail jewelry shops when twelve years ago he purchased a 1988 Testarossa from one of his customers, a doctor with stage 4 cancer. With health issues of his own, Robert and the doctor became good friends, supported one another personally, and while the doctor passed on, the Testarossa remains with Robert in its original condition. No doubt, the car will remain so in reverence to the good will it brought to the two men. Amen.

With that as your author here, there's nothing more beautiful I have to say in recounting the beloved chronicles of some incredible Testarossas belonging to members of the Southwest Region's FCA. May their stories live on in the perpetuity of the marque. *SF*


